# Cleaning Up Winter Debris

Q: I read that my plants should be left in the yard for winter interest and for a nesting area for insects and birds... I did this and now when can I start to clear the debris so I can start the garden again?

A: Ornamental grasses and other perennials left up for winter interest and nest building materials for birds need to be cut down to several inches above the soil line before growth begins. Ornamental grasses are a warm season grass; therefore, get the rest of your yard in order before tackling the grasses. Use a bungee cord or duct tape to tie the grasses together before using your pruners or shears. This will make it a much easier job for you.

The next area is your beds. Be careful when removing the mulch to allow the tender plants to acclimate. Look for emerging spring bulbs and the crowns of early perennials. Keep mulch handy in case the temperature drops and you need to recover the plants.

Over the winter, rabbits have probably fed on the lower branches of some of your shrubs versus the stems as a result of some good size snowdrifts. Have your pruners handy to prune back to a smaller branch or the next bud to repair the feeding damage. You may want to use a leaf blower to clean out your shrub beds. Also remove any crossing limbs that rub against one another. Prune back junipers, yews and arborvitae if needed.

When pruning flowering shrubs, timing is important to encourage this season's buds. Spring blooming plants such as lilac and forsythia bloom on "old wood" which formed last fall. The best time to prune spring bloomers is after they bloom. Summer flowering shrubs such as hydrangeas, butterfly bush, spirea and potentilla bloom on the current year's new growth. They should be pruned in winter or early spring before new flower buds form or if there is winter damage.

Use your leaf rake to clean up the winter debris on your lawn without damaging the turf that may have been pushed up and out of the ground by freezing and thawing. Don't forget to check your compost. If you've kept the compost pile active, congratulations. If not, you'll need to activate your compost pile by turning it. All of the material removed from your beds and lawn can be used in your compost. This is your brown material. If you collect lawn clippings/vegetable cuttings, you have your green and all the materials needed. The browns for carbon, the greens for moisture and the microorganisms will break down the waste to compost.

Congratulations on providing yourself winter interest, nesting materials and an area for overwintering insects. Now on to SPRING!!

#### McHenry County Gardenfest 2019

Saturday, April 6, 2019, from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Presented by University of Illinois Extension McHenry County Master Gardeners and McHenry County College Costs \$45 and includes lunch

Welcome Spring at the McHenry County Gardenfest. Come learn about new garden trends, plants, and techniques at this day-long series of garden-related seminars and workshops. Gardenfest 2019 will be held April 6 at McHenry County College (MCC), 8900 U.S. Route 14, in Crystal Lake, Ill., from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Gardenfest is an annual educational event co-sponsored by MCC and the University of Illinois Extension McHenry County Master Gardeners. A total of 20 breakout sessions – presented by industry experts, U of I Extension educators, Master Gardeners and MCC instructors – will cover a myriad of gardening topics.

The keynote speaker will be Dale Sievert, who owns an extensive moss garden, discussing "The Sievert Gardens--From 1970 Until Today." Sievert will outline the nearly-five-decade evolution of his award-winning moss gardens. He also will reveal how his style and thoughts about gardening have changed over the years.

Other 2019 Gardenfest topics will include "Best New Plants for 2019," "Invasive Species in Northern Illinois," "How to Vermicompost and Build Your Own Worm Bin," "Hydrangea Highlights," and many other classes.

Gardenfest boasts 20 breakout sessions offered in four segments; each segment lasts an hour. Lunch will be served midday in the MCC cafeteria. Attendees also are eligible for door prizes.

New this year is the half-day, kid-friendly session "Gardening with Family." The MCC Horticultural staff will teach gardening basics to children ages 8 to 14 with an adult (two children may attend with one adult). Participants will also work in the greenhouse, start seeds, transplant seedlings and learn about the plants they will take home. An adult must be present for the duration of the session. All supplies and morning refreshments provided. Advance registration required. Packet pickup begins at 8 a.m. Class runs from 8:30 a.m. until noon. Costs \$20 for one adult and one child, costs \$30 for one adult and two children.

Registration forms for Gardenfest are available online at mchenry.edu/gardenfest Registration begins Feb. 11, and the cost for Gardenfest is \$45. Space is limited, so register early. The registration deadline is March 22; no refunds after this date. Tickets can also be purchased at the door the day of the event (for an added \$5 fee, first come, first served).
