In the February issue of our newsletter we mentioned that the AHGC had awarded 3 grants to District 25 schools and had discussed the 2022 grant given to Ivy Hill School. Kim Eckert of Ivy Hill School had submitted an application for the 2023 grant by our deadline, but because of a computer glitch we did not receive it until she had followed up on her application. The board approved giving a 4th \$150 grant in March.

I was able to attend their Planting Day on Thursday, May 11th where they had the children gather outside to plant bean seeds to take home and then also spread flower seeds in the planters to create butterfly gardens. The planter boxes had been rebuilt by the district this year. Gourds will be planted along the edge of the school to sell at a farmers market in the fall, as they had done last year.

RECYCLING Tip of the Month



Here's a good tip and reminder from SWANCC.

When cardboard gets wet, it becomes heavy and begins to break down and fall apart and is unable to be baled and shipped to manufacturers to reuse it. Avoid getting your cardboard wet by making sure the lid on your recycling cart is always closed! If rain is anticipated in your area, don't leave cardboard next to your cart at the curb.

Solution: Break down boxes to take up less space in your cart, and keep any extra cardboard in your garage or basement to recycle it on a dry day.

Large Beardtongue

Penstemon grandiflorus

Large beardtongue is a perennial native plant that blooms in late May through June with large tubular-trumpet shaped flowers up to 2 inches long. The flowers are in shades of lavender, pink, or blue. There is a white stamen sparsely hairy on the tip end. The leaves are smooth, succulent in texture, and blue-gray or blue-green which provides a nice contrast with other landscape plants. The plant's beautiful and distinctive flowers attract hummingbirds, numerous types of insect eating birds, and various bees and butterflies.

Growth: 2-3 feet tall

Sun Exposure: Full sun to partial sun

Locations: Seen in prairies in few northern Illinois counties as it is listed as endangered.

Hardiness: Zones 3 to 9. Super easy to take care with resistance to most pests and diseases and

is drought resistant.

Soil: Clay, sand, and well drained garden soil. Invasive: Self-sows but is not invasive or aggressive.

The event will be in a mobile donation unit at the First Presbyterian Church parking lot in Arlington Heights on Saturday, July 8th, 2023 from 8:00 AM to 2:00 PM. This location is across from the Farmers Market and Library parking lots.

The blood drive was very successful last year, meeting our goal of collecting 25 pints of blood. These donations impacted and potentially saved 75 lives.

Each year, nearly 5 million Americans need blood transfusions. Blood helps trauma and burn patients, premature infants, heart surgery patients, organ transplant recipients and those fighting cancer, among others.
