Plant Sale Update for 2023

This year we have several significant changes due to the impact of the Asian Jumping Worm.

Our Master Gardeners shared the University of Illinois Extension recommendations for plant sales regarding the infestation of the Asian Jumping Worm. This is an invasive species taking over in many states and counties including Northeast Illinois. The Extension recommendation is not to sell plants dug up from your yards in an effort to slow the spread of these worms. There is more information on the Asian Jumping Worm in this newsletter. (See Page <u>6-7</u>.) The plant sale committee made several recommendations for this year and next year's sales based on another club's experience.

- 1) This year we will focus on selling seedlings we start from scratch. I'm asking for all those who can start some seed trays to do so. Please let me know what you are planning to grow and/or ask me for some recommendations so we don't have 500 tomato plants! Please plant flowers, vegetables, herbs or houseplant cuttings. Using new, sterile potting mix to start seeds and cuttings, is perfectly safe. Also, if houseplants have never been outside on the ground, they are safe.
- 2) If you would like to dig up perennials from your yard, you will need to follow a procedure which should eliminate any transferring of the worm eggs (cocoons) with the plants. If there is any evidence or suspicion of jumping worms, we will not be able to accept the plants for our plant sale. Absent those conditions, you should carefully dig up the plants, knock off all the soil, separate each plant and then wash the roots with a strong blast from a hose to ensure no eggs (cocoons) are still present. Then pot your perennials using new, sterile potting mix. Please wash pots in warm, soapy water before using. We will purchase quantities of potting mix for you to use just let us know if you need some. It is easiest to dig, wash and pot up the plants when they are small. They are easier to handle and will establish quickly when small. Keep the newly potted plants in the shade for a week or so before gradually introducing them to more direct sunlight. Do not store them on mulch as that is a prime habitat for the jumping worms.
- 3) Our plant sale will include the above plants, vintage garden items and a big push on making the community aware of this "pest."

For the **2024 Plant Sale** we will be checking the yards of those wanting to contribute for the Asian Jumping Worms. Those with no traces of worms will be able to contribute as before. Those with jumping worms will not be able to contribute. We are hoping for some solutions for these critters but nothing is available at this time.

Jumping Worms —WHAT?

Invasive Species Alert

......worms that wiggle so rapidly they've been dubbed jumping worms. Mr. B. in New Lenox thinks he got them from a bag of mulch he bought. He spotted them last fall in his garden but jumping worms have been around northern Illinois since 2015. In the Midwest the worms were first officially spotted in 2013, at the University of Wisconsin arboretum in Madison. The worms are actually native to East Asia and have also been called crazy worms, Alabama jumpers and snake worms.

The worms don't actually jump but they wiggle a lot, thrash wildly when they are handled or disturbed and can shed their tail in defense. They are about 4-8 inches long and are darker on top than on the bottom with a glossy or iridescent skin. There is also a smooth colored band (milky white clitellum) that circles the body. The band is flush, not raised.

You will **find these creatures between mid-summer through the first hard freeze**. They breed quickly during the growing season as it takes only 60 days for adults to reach maturity and yes, their eggs will survive a Chicago winter and hatch in mid April after temperatures reach 50 degrees. Oh, and did I mention they are capable of reproducing without mating!

Why are we so concerned about these worms? Unfortunately, they have the potential of changing our soil structure by damaging plant roots, changing water holding capacity of the soil and depleting available nutrients in the soil. Jumping worms are found in the top 3-4 inches of the soil and in leaf litter. Their appetite for organic matter is voracious and their rapid reproductive rate creates a threat to our forest floors and native environments.

What about our residential lawns? Landscapers have been known to reapply mulch numerous times in a growing season because the worms have consumed it so quickly. They LOVE the organic matter until it's all gone.....and yes, they have been known to destroy lawns! You can pull up your grass like a carpet and find the worms below. Grubs in your lawn will feed on grass roots, but jumping worms turn the soil into the texture of discarded coffee grounds which does not support the root structure. The soil can no longer retain moisture as it passes through too quickly and it is lacks the nutrients to support the health of the plant. Nothing will grow in this type of soil.

What's a gardener to do?

Well, researchers are still searching for the best way to control this creature. For right now, if you spot a jumping worm, grab your gloves and a clear plastic bag, secure the worms in the bag, placing the bag in the sun until they die and throw the bag away! You can also place vinegar or rubbing alcohol in the bag. Obviously a temporary fix!

Researchers do know that heat treated mulch >130 degrees Fahrenheit for >3 days will kill the cocoons. In Illinois, compost producers are required to complete this process. Another option is to purchase bagged mulch. With compost and mulch being the prime food source of these worms be careful of your mulch and compost sources!

The Arboretum at the University of Wisconsin, after a pilot study, continues to explore using an organic, low nitrogen fertilizer (3-0-1) specifically used in the golf course industry. It contains tea seed meal which contains saponins, a toxin that affects the worms. It is applied in late April to target hatchlings and summer, to suppress the worms. With a small population it is recommended to make a mustard solution of 1/3 cup of dry mustard in one gallon of water and trench an area of soil. This irritates the worms, bringing them to the surface to be easily removed.

Unfortunately, once you have the worms in your soil, they may be here to stay. We just need to figure out how to live with them. I wonder if anybody knows if chickens feast on jumping worms?

Isn't it always something? Jumping Worms

Invasive jumping worms now pose an environmental threat to soil, flora, and fauna. Although these worms die over winter, they leave tiny cocoons (about the size of a poppy seed) that will begin hatching in mid-spring. NOW is the time to minimize the spread of the worms and cocoons.

Clitellum is smooth, milky white and wraps around entire body

Body is shiny, dark gray to brown in color

- When adding new plants, choose bareroot rather than potted plants if possible.
- Check all potted plants for worms as well as castings (see photo below right).
- When sharing or transplanting plants, rinse roots, removing all soil.
- Use only mulch, compost, and added soil that have been heated to 105°-130° F for at least 3 days.
- Thoroughly clean soil and compost from all shoes, equipment, and tools.




Jumping worms consume organic matter drying out soil and creating texture resembling coffee grounds (left side in image above).



SWANCC has just announced that empty and clean paper cups are now accepted for recycling. There are new technology advancements for sorting paper cup materials. They sometimes pick things up from the side of the road, and various neighbors and friends will let them know if there is a treasure to be found, discarded by someone else. Patty loves garden art, as you can see from the photographs.

Jim and Patty have been married for 36 wonderful years. Jim grew up on a farm in the community of Villa Grove, IL, and after college taught at Marquette High School in Ottawa, IL, where he met Patty. After teaching in Catholic high schools for 9 years he went to work for Country Companies, a farm insurance company for 12 years before getting his MS in education. He then taught biology, earth and environmental science at Crystal Lake Central High School for the next 15 years. He also taught nucleonics (all things nuclear and how radiation is used) which very few schools teach. Teaching is where his heart truly lies.



Spring Beauty

Claytonia virginica

You will know it's spring when this attractive perennial wildflower starts to appear! Spring beauty belongs to the Purslane Family and is *ephemeral*, a plant that completes its lifecycle in just a few weeks. It is a low growing plant with loose clusters of light pink or white flowers with fine dark pink stripes. It grows from an underground tuber which is actually edible and has a sweet chest-nut-like flavor. The flowers open on warm sunny days and close at night or on cloudy days. Both the flowers and foliage do fade away by mid-summer. Spring beauty is very spectacular in large patches and can be used as groundcover.
